## PROGRAMME EVENTS



## TUESDAY 18TH FEBRUARY 2025

In an inspiring and informative talk, Tom Way shared some highlights from his career as a wildlife photographer, from penguins in the Falklands, to elephants beside Kilimanjaro. He spoke on the difficulties of the job, such as standing for 4 days in the water for a photo of a water vole, hiking for 8 hours a day whilst photographing orangutans in Borneo, or travelling 45 minutes off the coast of Sri Lanka every day for two weeks to catch the perfect shot of a blue whale. He shared interesting facts learned from his career; the audience learned about the right or left-handedness of elephants, the gorilla's magpie-like interest in stealing wedding rings, and the dangers of leaving £30,000 worth of uninsured photography equipment around a cantankerous hippo. He also spoke on conservation, emphasising the drop in the black rhinoceroses' numbers from 80,000 to 4,000 in the past 40 years, and on meeting Craig, the largest of only 16 remaining "supertusker" elephants. Overall, this talk gave a fascinating glimpse into the life of one of the world's most unusual and adventurous professions, complete with his sharing of his favourite photographs, and their oftentimes humorous backstories. # FIT Counts: Community based Pollinator Monitoring Scheme (PoMS)

The UK PoMS recording season runs from 1 April to 30 September each year. Flower-Insect Timed Counts...

Spend ten minutes watching flowers and insects in good



weather! This simple survey collects data on the total number of insects that visit a particular flower, ideally chosen from our list of 14 target flowers. Repeat counts add extra value to the survey records. FIT Counts can be done anywhere,

including gardens and parks, in warm, dry weather during daylight hours from 1 April to 30 September.

## Summer show (19th July) Classes

### Flowers

- Vase of sweet peas (Spencer type) colour variation allowed 7 stems – sweet pea foliage only.
- 2. Vase of sweet peas any type (colour variations allowed) 9 stems sweet pea foliage only.
- 3. Vase of large flowered (HT) roses mixed varieties 3 blooms.
- 4. 3 stems of miniature or patio roses one or mixed varieties.
- 5. One specimen bloom of large flowered (HT) rose.
- 6. Vase of 3 large flowered (HT) roses one bud, one exhibition bloom and one full-blown bloom one variety..
- Vase of any other roses except large flowered (HT) mixed varieties – 3 stems.
- 8. Vase of pinks -7 stems not disbudded.
- Vase of pansies or violas with foliage 7 blooms single or mixed colours allowed.
- 10. Vase of any other annual flowers (hardy or half hardy) not more than two kinds colour variation allowed (excluding classes 1 & 2.)
- Vase of any other perennial flowers not more than two kinds colour variation allowed.
- 12. Vase of mixed flowering shrubs minimum 3 kinds (excluding roses.)
- 13. A single stem of bloom (shrubs permitted) excluding roses.
- 14. Container of cactus and/or succulent plant(s). Number of plants not to exceed 6, in a container up to 9" diameter or length.
- 15. One flowering plant in a pot, not to exceed 9" diameter.
- 16. One foliage plant in a pot, not to exceed 9" diameter.

### Vegetables

- 17. Carrots one variety 5.
- 18. Broad beans one variety 6 pods.
- $19. \quad Peas-one\ variety-9\ pods\ (not\ mangetout.)$
- 20. Potatoes one variety 5 round or kidney. Any colour.
- 21. Lettuce, with roots one variety -2.
- 22. Herbs 3 kinds to be displayed in 3 separate vases (2.5" diameter.)
- 23. Rhubarb 3 sticks with not more than 3" of leaf blade left attached.
- 24. Courgettes 3 of any single variety no longer than 6".
- 25. Any other vegetable one variety number optional.
- 26. Collection of one each of 3 types of vegetable, but not more than 2 types from classes 17 to 21.

#### Frui

- 27. Blackcurrants 15 bunches displayed individually.
- 28. Gooseberries dish of 20.
- 29. Raspberries with stalks dish of 20.
- 30. Strawberries dish of 10.
- 31. Dish of any other fruit number optional.
- Collection of mixed fruits, to consist of 3 separate fruit varieties; number optional.

### Floral Art

- 33. A petite exhibit. Max 9" width & depth.
- 34. A vertical exhibit using 3 blooms, plus foliage. Max 12" wide by 18" high.
- 35. "Your garden in Summer". Max 24" in any direction.
- A Trug (basket or box) of flowers, fruit and vegetables for Sunday lunch
- 37. Men only. An exhibit in a hollowed-out vegetable.

#### Cookery

- 38. One jar of lemon curd.
- 39. One jar of chutney.
- 40. One jar of marmalade.
- 41. 6 cheese scones.
- 42. 6 bread rolls (50/50 white/wholemeal).
- 43. 6 Ginger biscuits.
- 44. 4 vegetarian tarts (max 4" diameter).
- 45. Carrot cake (own recipe).
- 46. Marmalade cake (own recipe).

### Homecraft

- 47. Photograph "Along the riverbank".
- 48. Photograph "A local church tower".
- 49. Photograph "Reading brickwork".
- 50. Photograph "Working on your garden or allotment".
- 51. A handmade "Get well" card.
- 52. A fabric tote bag.
- 53. An item of handmade jewellery.
- 54. A picture of a flower (any medium except photograph).
- 55. A doorstop.
- 56. A soft toy knitted or sewn.

### Things to do this month



- Now's the time to plant your chitted first early potatoes.
- Once the daffodils have finished flowering, deadhead them and leave the foliage to die back naturally.
- Dig up large snowdrop clumps while their leaves are still green and divide them into smaller clumps for replanting. This will encourage them to spread.
- Choose a day when the grass is dry and cut your lawn on a high setting.
- Sow tomato seeds and chillies in pots and put them in a greenhouse or warm sunny windowsill to germinate and grow.
- Clear weeds from borders and dig compost or wellrotted stable manure into your vegetable beds to get ready for spring planting
- > Top-dress shrubs in pots by removing the top 5cm (2in) of old compost and replacing it with fresh.
