#### Things to do this month



#### In the garden:

- 1. Remove decaying leaves and plants from ponds.
- **2.** After storms, check for broken branches and prune back to healthy wood to prevent further damage.
- **3.** Plant bare-root hedging in dug-over and enriched soil if weather is fine.
- 4. Plan next year's garden.
- **5.** Send the mower off for servicing and check and repair hand tools.

#### In the greenhouse:

- 6. Clear out any accumulated mess, surplus pots and seed trays.
- 7. Check greenhouse plants for pests and remove any yellow or diseased leaves.
- 8. Water sparingly early in the day and ventilate on mild days to keep the atmosphere dry.
- 9. Check heating is working efficiently if you are keeping frost-tender plants in the greenhouse.
- 10. Check to ensure gutters and downpipes aren't blocked by fallen leaves and debris.

## On the allotment and in the vegetable garden...

- 11. Cover empty beds with fleece or clear (not black) plastic, which will warm the soil, so it is easier to work.
- 12. Spread compost or well-rotted manure over the beds.
- 13. Remove netting from fruit cages to allow birds to scratch about for pests.
- 14. Sort out leftover or half-empty seed packets and throw out any that are out of date.
- 15. Plan your crops and compile your seed order for next year.

#### FLORAL ARRANGEMENT AND HANDICRAFT CLASSES

- An arrangement to be seen all around to represent the carol "The Holly and the Ivy". Additional plant material may be used. MAXIMUM size (in any direction) 18 inches.
- A Christmas wreath, suitable for a front door. Accessories permitted. MAXIMUM diameter 12 inches (internal measurement.)
- 3. (MEN ONLY) A Christmas arrangement in a gravy boat.
- 4. Photograph: "Fallen leaves".
- 5. Photograph: "Bird(s) on a feeder".
- 6. A Christmas table decoration to include a candle.
- A Christmas lantern (using either a candle or LED light). Maximum height 30cm.

# VEGETABLES, FRUIT AND FLOWER CLASSES

- 8. Potatoes 3. One variety. Round or kidney.
- 9. Collection of 3 vegetables.
- A specimen parsnip. Foliage to be trimmed to 4" from the crown.
- 11. Brussels sprouts, 10.
- 12. A specimen leek with roots.
- 13. Pears, 3.
- 14. Apples, cooking, 3 of one variety.
- 15. Apples, dessert, 3 of one variety.
- 16. A single stem of bloom (shrubs permitted.)
- 17. 9" pan, pot or bowl of a flowering/fruiting plant or plants.
- 18. 9" pan, pot or bowl of a foliage plant or plants.

#### HOME COOKERY

- **19.** A rich fruit cake (Christmas cake) without icing or decoration. Own recipe. 8" diameter.
- **20.** 6 mince pies (short crust pastry.)
- **21.** A jar of chutney.
- 22. A Stollen (own recipe.)
- **23.** 6 sausage rolls (puff pastry.)
